I don't like (not like) maths, but I like (like) PE. My mum says (say) that I am (be) very sporty. I like (like) spending time outdoors. My mum thinks (think) that I spend too much time outdoors riding a bike or playing volleyball with my friends. But she doesn't understand (not understand) that it helps (help) me relax and even study better. Some of my classmates don't spend (not spend) enough time in the fresh air. They usually play (play) video games after school. My best friend Amanda likes (like) riding a bike, but she doesn't like (not like) team sports. That's why she does (do) gymnastics in her free time.
